

- 1. ST. THOMAS AQUINAS CATHOLIC CHURCH** 1919
130 W. Ojai Avenue
 Mission Revival structure designed by Mead & Requa.
 City of Ojai Landmark No. 7
 National Register of Historic Places
Today: Ojai Valley Museum

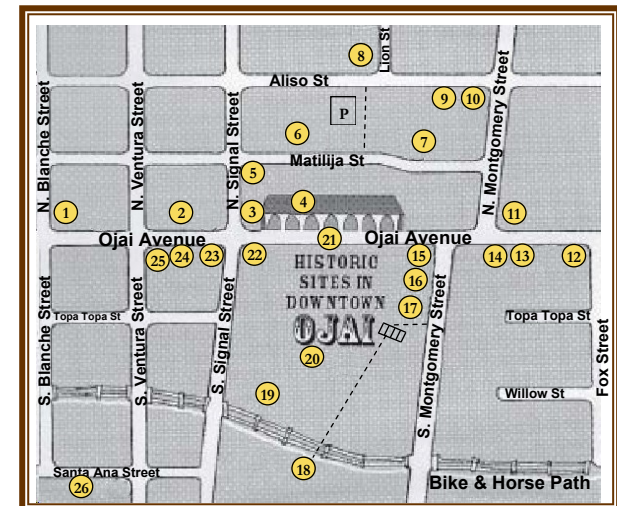

- 2. EL ROBLAR HOTEL** 1920
122 W. Ojai Avenue
 Mission Revival structure designed by Mead & Requa.
 Renovation by David Bury - 2005-2006.
Today: The Oaks at Ojai
- 3. CLARK LIVERY** 1916
202 E. Ojai Avenue
 Site of the Nordhoff Livery beginning in 1887. Bob and Tom Clark were both stage drivers at times. Tom Clark owned the livery in the early 1900s. In 1916, Clark built an auto livery on the site using native stone. The auto livery was renovated into a drug store in 1927.
Today: Ojai Village Pharmacy
- 4. THE ARCADE** 1917
Ojai Avenue (from Signal Street eastward)
 Mission Revival structure designed by Mead & Requa.
 Four arches added at the east end in 1927.

- 5. SESPE STONE WALL** ca.1914
120 N. Signal Street at Matilija
 Constructed around home of Tom Clark, Ventura County Supervisor 1904-1936, of sandstone blocks salvaged from original Ventura County Court-house. The Clark home was torn down ca. 1964.

- 6. NORDHOFF BRICK SCHOOLHOUSE** 1876
210 E. Matilija Street
 The first school within the town of Nordhoff (now Ojai); later the home of Ojai mayor, Alton Drown. The much-altered building began being used as a hotel/bed & breakfast in the late 1940s.

Today: The Lavender Inn
- 7. JOHN MONTGOMERY HOME** 1875
310 E. Matilija Street
 Historical accounts say John Montgomery's house began as an adobe and was wood-sided later. The large Edwin Baker family bought the home ca. 1888 and added rooms and the second story.
Today: Porch Gallery
- 8. GEORGE THACHER MEMORIAL LIBRARY** 1893
E. Aliso Street at Lion Street (northwest corner)
 Nordhoff's first library built on South Montgomery Street near where the Art Center is today. Sherman Day Thacher, founder of Thacher School, donated \$500 in memory of his brother George to purchase books. Moved to this location ca. 1938.
Today: Privately owned
- 9. ALISO STREET ADOBE** 1941
307 - 307A E. Aliso Street
 Built as a duplex by William L. Benson partly from adobe bricks, timbers, and roof tiles salvaged from the demolished parish hall of St. Thomas Aquinas Church. The "River of Life" doors also came from the church.

Today: Privately owned
- 10. PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH** 1884
213 N. Montgomery St. at Aliso Street
 The first church in the Ojai Valley. This Colonial Revival structure has been moved twice. It served Presbyterians for 46 years; then the Nazarenes for 50 years. Designed by J. Cleaveland Cady.

- 11. NORDHOFF GRAMMAR SCHOOL and CHAPARRAL AUDITORIUM** 1927 1938
414 E. Ojai Avenue at Montgomery Street
 Eight Mission-style classrooms were built in 1927, three and a kindergarten on Ojai Avenue and four on Montgomery Street. Three classrooms were added in 1929 and three in 1937. Designed by Roy Wilson.

Today: Ojai Unified School District Offices

- 12. SHELL SERVICE STATION** 1936
459 E. Ojai Avenue
 Built for Elmer Friend in the Mission style.
 Designed by Austen Pierpont.
Today: Ojai Rôtie Restaurant
- 13. BILL BAKER'S BAKERY** 1927
457 E. Ojai Avenue
 Bill Baker was known worldwide as the "Picasso" of cake decoration. He created huge, elaborate cakes. He also produced health breads made from soy and lima bean flours.
 Designed by Roy Wilson.
Today: Azu Restaurant
- 14. OJAI VALLEY WOMAN'S CLUB** 1911
441 E. Ojai Avenue
 Built in 1911 for the King's Daughters service group. The women voted to become the Ojai Valley Woman's Club in 1914. The clubhouse remains an active center for community activities.

- 15. CITY GARAGE** 1922
345 E. Ojai Avenue
 Robert Winfield built this service station in the Mission style for George Holsten. The Ojai Valley Cleaners was located here for over fifty years.
Today: Topa Topa Brewing Co.



16. OJAI FIRE STATION 1936

109 S. Montgomery Street

Built with W.P.A. funds. Home to the Ojai Valley Historical Museum from 1979 to 1996. Ventura County Landmark No. 62

Today: The Ojai Vineyard Tasting Room

17. OJAI ART CENTER 1939

113 S. Montgomery Street

Dr. Charles Butler spearheaded the building of this community project. The center is member-supported and multi-disciplinary.

Designed by Austen Pierpont.

1997 exterior renovation by Marc Whitman.

18. OJAI JAIL 1928

Libbey Park

Ojai's second jail structure; home to some 650 inmates during the 50 years it was in use.

Designed by Roy Wilson.

19. LIBBEY BOWL and SYCAMORE TREE 1957/2011
Libbey Park

Venue for the Ojai Music Festival and other cultural events. Original 1957 bowl designed by Austen Pierpont and Roy Wilson. New bowl built in 2011 from plans by David Bury. The sycamore tree, known as the Peace Tree or Marriage Tree, is sacred to the Chumash. The over 200-year-old tree is Ventura County Landmark No. 27.

20. CIVIC CENTER TENNIS COURTS 1896
and TENNIS TOURNAMENT

Libbey Park

Site of "The Ojai," one of the oldest amateur tennis tournaments in the United States; begun by William L. Thacher who founded the Ojai Valley Tennis Club in 1895 (still in existence).

The Wall of Champions plaques commemorate the tournament and the players.

21. PERGOLA and MEMORIAL 1917/1999
FOUNTAIN

Libbey Park

Mission Revival structure with pergola and two grand arches fronting the park. Designed by Mead & Requa. Demolished in 1971. Rebuilt in 1999 from the Mead & Requa plans modified by David Bury. The pergola fountain was also rebuilt in 1999. The fountain plaque dates to 1904 when the original fountain/horse trough was built.

22. POST OFFICE TOWER and PORTICO 1917

201 E. Ojai Avenue

Mission Revival structure designed by Mead & Requa. The tower was loosely fashioned after the campanile of the Havana Cathedral in Cuba.

23. OJAI PLAYHOUSE 1914

145 E. Ojai Avenue

Local realtor John J. Burke built the movie theater. It was called the Isis Theater until 1926. The lobby had originally been a market with an adjacent ice plant. A Mission-style façade covered the three businesses, the first Mission-style building in town.

24. MARAVILLA COMPANY OFFICE 1921
(later called Ojai Valley Company)

121 E. Ojai Avenue

The company was initially formed to develop and sell land in the Arbolada tract. The Arbolada development was conceived by Edward D. Libbey.

Designed by Frank Mead.

25. OJAI LIBRARY (East-West wing) 1928

111 E. Ojai Avenue

Designed by Carleton Monroe Winslow.
North-South wing: 1981

26. SMITH-HOBSON ESTATE 1907-1926

401 S. Ventura Street

Former home of the Hobson and Smith families. Abram and Helen Hobson purchased a bungalow on this property in 1907 and proceeded over years to renovate and enlarge it. Home was converted to the Spanish style and a guest house built in 1925-1926. Given to the city by the Smith-Hobson family in 1973. Ojai city offices opened here in 1976.

A Walking Tour of Historic Downtown Ojai

No walking tour of downtown Ojai can begin without acknowledging the contributions of Edward Drummond Libbey of Toledo, Ohio.

The wealthy glass manufacturer and his wife Florence first visited the dusty little village of Nordhoff (Ojai) in 1907. They bought property in the Foothills tract in 1909 and built a winter home. Libbey fell in love with the town and in 1916 spearheaded a downtown redevelopment based on City Beautiful principles that became an example to other cities in California.

There is no doubt that Libbey was inspired in his vision, a vision brought to reality by the talent of architects Frank Mead and Richard Requa of San Diego and with the cooperation of the local residents.
